According to Webster, transition is "a passing from


Call upon Him when you are faced with a difficult transition and don't forget to thank Him when you successfully navigate any transition, be it difficult or easy.

Answer to January's Quiz: Retirement: In September 1924, General Pershing retired from his long Army career of 38 years. He remained chairman of the Monuments Commission which looks after the grave sites of soldiers killed in France during WW I. The Commission sent him to France and Micheline (the love of his life) several months of the year. In 1928 Blackjack Pershing hosted a fund-raising dinner for the National Cathedral in Washington DC, whose cornerstone had been laid by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1907, but was still in the early stages of construction. By the way, the National Cathedral was finished in 1990—84 years of construction. Moral of this story--things don't happen fast in Washington DC.
