I have often thought that fathers got short changed in what they get on Father's Day compared to what mothers get on Mother's Day. The ladies usually get flowers, candy, jewelry and taken out to dinner, in addition to the obligatory greeting card extolling their virtues and value as an important person in the family. In contrast, fathers get a necktie (I have a closet full that I never wear); cuff links (who wears French cuffs any more? I don't even think the French do); socks- now there's a practical gift. I can always use socks. We usually get a card, although it is not as mushy as the one the women get.

Perhaps the campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers has not met the same enthusiasm as mothers because fathers don't have the same sentimental appeal that mothers have. A survey asked boys who they would be most likely to confide in if they had a problem and about 23% said their father. The remaining 77% said they would confide in their mother.

Mother's Day is thought to be the inspiration for Father's Day. The Mother's Day we celebrate today has its origins in the peace and reconciliation campaigns of the post Civil War era. During the 1860's, at the urging of Ann Reeves Jarvis, one divided West Virginia town celebrated - "Mother's Work Days" that brought together the mothers of both Confederate and Union soldiers.

On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in the memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Mononzah, but it was a one time commemoration and not an annual holiday.

The next year, a Spokane, Washington woman named, Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, merchants, the YMCA, and government officials to get support for her idea and she was successful: Washington celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.


