

Commander's Corner: Capt Ed Murphy

Just The Facts Ma'am

If you're in your 'senior' years you'll remember this tag line from Frank Smith's partner on Dragnet, Sgt Joe Friday. Friday was the consummate detective. He didn't want your suppositions, your analysis, or your shaky conclusions, only what you observed, as clearly reported as possible. He would stitch it all together, draw the conclusions, and take the action. Friday's approach, a blend of natural skepticism and drive for absolute clarity, got me to thinking. Doesn't that approach, in many respects, mirror the way we as citizens should confront the current issues facing us and those reporting on them?

Our Founding Fathers, those who put this nation on the road and gave it wheels, had more than a few words to say on the matter. Of course they were hard over on the need for free expression and we have that codified in our Bill of Rights. But they went a good deal further than simply establishing a citizen's right to say anything and know everything. They state unequivocally that we have been given this right, not for our personal amusement but so that we can competently carry out our responsibility for running the Country, because through the electoral process we make our Nation's ultimate decisions.

We had the good fortune at our November meeting to receive a report from LTG Keith Dayton on two issues of some considerable urgency for our Country at this moment, Ukraine and Gaza. I'm confident that Gen Dayton would have received an A+ from Joe Friday. But the real question is what would Joe Friday have done with the Gen Dayton's evidence. I'm dead certain Joe would not have sat on it.

At this juncture we seem to be in Joe Friday's shoes. As citizens we have met the witness and heard his evidence. Do we treat it as simply, "interesting" or do we actively seek to exercise our responsibilities as citizens using the lawful avenues open to us. I'm trying to do a better job of getting to know the candidates and voting in EVERY election, and getting to know my Congresspeople via phone and letter. Running for a local office might be another option.

Joe Friday was very good at getting the evidence from his witnesses, and, as I recall, his conviction rate was equally good. So, with Gen Dayton's evidence I'm sure I know what Joe Friday would do.

However, at Christmas time, he had a problem. He simply could not buy this tale of 'God becoming human' and all of the accompanying celebration. He could not even bring himself to pretend for the sake of the children. His integrity would not permit any phony displays.

On Christmas Eve his family was eagerly preparing to attend worship services. Bill's children were singing in the choir and he wanted to hear them. But, no, he could not, he would not, compromise himself. He was convinced that to maintain his self-worth, he must remain at home that evening.

A short time passed after his family left, and it began to snow. Bill sat in his chair, turned on the television, noting that the pace of the snow was quickening. A toasty fire in the fireplace next to him added a sense of coziness and serenity. Bill dozed off. Then, suddenly, a noise awakened him. He looked outside through the window and saw nothing. 
