Commander's Corner: Capt Ed Murphy

An Unexpected Gift--You have no doubt had the experience of giving someone a hand, and lo and behold, it works out better for you than for that someone to whom you lent a hand in the first place. You walk away talking to yourself and saying, "That's not the way it's supposed to work," and feeling a bit embarrassed over the entire episode. I've had experiences like that from time to time over the years and I had another one just last week at our February Chapter meeting.

I thought I was performing a yeoman's service for the Chapter at last Sunday's meeting by booking in Air Force Brig. Gen. Frank Goodell to talk about the first round-the-world flight. It filled the slot; the subject was timely; the General gets another platform from which to promote the centennial celebration of this noteworthy event; and the event promoters pick up a few more potential attendees. Everybody wins, right? Sure. And there is every reason to think it will work out just that way. So where is the big personal payoff in all this that I didn't see coming? It was Frank Goodell himself.

First of all, I didn't know that Gen Goodell was such a great storyteller. Not only did he have a very engaging platform style, but he knew more about that round-the-World mission than I think even the original crew did. He had done his homework. Not only that, he seemed to have total recall, offering obscure bits of unsolicited information, and answering every question, it seemed, with the recall of one who had actually been there. Who would know about killing the drift by lining up a smoke column with lines drawn on the horizontal Stabilizer. I was as spellbound as a kid taking his first flight. And that was just one example.

Second, Frank Goodell knows how to hold an audience. Clearly, he has great respect for the people who undertook this mission and he communicated that throughout his presentation. But he also respected his listeners, explaining the technical terms where that was needed and always talking with his audience rather than to them. When the presentation was complete it was Gen Goodell who put us together for the "cup" photo. There was no doubt he was having a good time and in his own way was putting us at our ease as well.

When all's said and done however, what stands out in sharp relief is that Brigadier General Frank Goodell, United States Air Force, has, over the last 68 years, carved out his own place in the Field of Aviation. Whether In the Military, Industry, or his Community he has joined and often led the effort to take Aviation to the next level. His contribution continues to this day as he coleads the 100th Anniversary Celebration to honor the aviators who completed that round the World trip of which he spoke at our Feb meeting. Gen Goodell, we are proud to number you among the visitors to our Chapter, and we salute you as you continue your efforts to advance the cause of Aviation.

Puget Sound Chapter Chaplain Notes—LCDR Skip Stephan USNR

A man who is reasonably well known in his home community has a summer home in the mountains. The nearest town is ten miles away. No one knows him there. He is a stranger to the merchants of that city. Sometimes when he is working in his old dirty clothes, he will discover that he needs something, and he will go into town just as he is. Often, when he goes to town, he will be wearing blue jeans and a work shirt. Less frequently, he will come to town in a suit and tie. The kind of reception that he gets in the store is related to how he is dressed. If he comes in his 'grubbies' the clerk is likely to ask, "Is there something you want?" If he comes in his clean blue jeans, the greeting he receives is, "What may I do for you today?" If he comes in a suit and tie, the clerk quickly comes to him and says, "Good morning, sir, how can I help you today?"

Although we may not like to admit it, we treat people in different ways, often depending on how they dress. We give the policeman more respect than we give the door-to-door salesman. If we were to treat the policeman as we treat the door-to-door salesman, we could be in trouble. It is important, therefore, to know who it is you are speaking to.

Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Christ." (Mark 8:29) We speak of "Jesus Christ" as if the two words were the parts of a name, like John Smith. This is not the case. The word 'Christ' is a title. It is the Greek equivalent for the Hebrew word 'Messiah.' So, when we say, 'Jesus Christ,' we are really saying, 'Jesus, the Messiah. When Peter said, "You are the Christ," he was indicating that Jesus was more than human. In Matthew's account of the incident, he records that Peter said, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." (Matthew 16:16) We are currently in the season of Lent, a forty-day period prior to Easter. For Christians, it is a time repentance and reflection in preparation for the celebration of Jesus' resurrection on Easter. It is a good time for us to contemplate the same question Jesus put to His disciples. It is a personal question for all of us, "Who do YOU say that I am?"






Book Reader
