#### Commander Corner: Captain Carrie Nielson, USN, Ret

My goodness how time flies! I can't believe it is almost September, but it is, and I have so much to share with you.

I had a wonderful time at my first national MOWW convention. I met so many delightful companions and learned a lot about the Order. Our chapter was recognized for all the hard work our companions did in 2023/24. We earned 3rd place for Scouting, 2nd place for ROTC/JROTC and Homeland Security, 1<sup>st</sup> place for National Security, Patriotic Education, Newsletter, Information & Publicity, and a Recruiting Merit Award for the most new members (32). Dick Muri took top recruiter honors for recruiting 19 new members! I attended a very moving memorial service where we celebrated the memories of all the companions we lost in the past year, including four from our chapter: Lt Col William Zimmerman, Ms. Charlotte Medlock, CW4 Jack Jory and LTG William Harrison. I learned more about the new partnerships that MOWW has formed. I learned that members may want to consider opting into that free AUSA membership that is now available, even if they are not in the Army, because it comes with lots of excellent discounts, family scholarships and other benefits they did not fully explain when they rolled it out. We will also be researching our options regarding the Wreaths Across America program, another new MOWW partner. During the business session, two significant bylaw changes were passed. One change specified that a chapter will not be allowed to add any hereditary, non-veteran members if their percentage veteran membership is below 75%. This restriction is necessary to meet the requirement for our IRS 501(c)19 status. The other change opened the membership criteria to admit noncommissioned officers in paygrades E7 and above into the Military Order.

Also in August, we held our annual chapter picnic and Northwest Youth Leadership Conference fundraiser. After a brief wind and rain scare, the skies cleared and we had absolutely beautiful weather at our breathtaking setting. The food and drink were delicious and the company could not have been better. Can not thank the Muri's enough for their generosity in hosting us for this event. Can't imagine a better spot or more gracious hosts. We broke bread, I shared the great news from the convention, we welcomed a couple of new companions into our chapter, including our first senior enlisted member. Rob Stockton a JROTC instructor at Peninsula High School. What an honor and a privilege to be part of that historic moment! Then we had a couple of top students from this year's NWYLC tell the gathering about their experience. Alan Mandigo let everyone know how they could contribute to keep this terrific program going. I am happy to announce that between donations and pledges received through the picnic and our anonymous matching donor, we anticipate collecting just over \$20,000, putting us well on our way to covering the costs for next year's event. 
