
CAPT Nielson reminds all friends and companions that the Washington State Patriotic Day is coming on 22 March at Pioneer Middle School. Please get the word out.



Chaplain's Corner, LCDR Stephan, USN, Ret

This month we begin the time in the church year called "Lent". For Christians, Lent is a 40 day period of spiritual preparation for Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday which this year is March 5th.

In scripture, the number 40 is often symbolic, indicating spiritual preparation.

Moses was 40 years in the Sinai desert. It was a time of training for his work of leading the Hebrews out of Egypt. The Hebrews were 40 years in the desert as they prepared to go into the promised land.

For Christians, however, the New Testament reference to Christ's 40 days in the Judean wilderness has become a pattern for the Christian year. Jesus had been baptized by John the Baptist and immediately He went into the wilderness where He was tempted by the Devil. For 40 days, Jesus centered his thoughts upon God and His own ministry. During this time, Jesus endured physical temptations but did not give in to them.

Today, as we prepare to meet Jesus at Easter, we do not live in the quiet solitude of the wilderness where we could concentrate solely on spiritual things. Most people go about their daily routine continuing a regular work schedule at their places of business or at home doing housework and preparing meals. The world does not stop because it is Lent.



Lent can be forty days of preparation during which we seek to deepen the spiritual side of our lives. People refer to the "3 R's" of academic learning. I would like to suggest that there are "3 R's" of spiritual learning to which we can give special attention during Lent.

The first 'R' is the R of Review. In any time of preparation individuals must begin by knowing where they are and what is their present condition. Lent should be a time to take stock of one's spiritual condition. If we are to do this successfully, we need the Spirit of God in our hearts and minds to make us sensitive to our own sins. Regularly during Lent we should ask ourselves. "Why am I doing this?" "Does my social life reflect my Christian convictions?" "Am I an instrument of God's peace?"

The 2nd 'R' is that of Repentance. The Greek word, which is translated 'repentance' in the New Testament means "to change" or "to turn." It means that something you once accepted, you now reject. Repentance also includes the idea of sorrow for the harm that your sinful act may have brought upon others.

Repentance goes beyond merely giving up something which is sinful. It means rejecting it completely. All too often people give up sinful acts, not because they are sorry for them but rather because the activity is dangerous and they are afraid of the consequences.

The final 'R' is that of Renewal. Notice the progression. Review leads to repentance and repentance leads to renewal. Renewal is having a fresh start in life, making a new beginning with a clean slate.

We all need new beginnings. Many people live under the cloud of past sin and the guilt this sin produced. Jesus has promised that our sins are forgiven. Through Him we receive a fresh start which gives us a sense of joy and peace. Review and repentance find their completion in renewal.
