Chaplain's Corner, LCDR Stephan, USN, Ret

In John 13:34 Jesus says, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another."

The command is new not only in its purpose, but also in its manner or intent. Jesus said, "Love as I have loved you." That's new. The old command says "Love your neighbor more than yourself: as Jesus did. Love, even if it means your own death.


A young man joined the Marines and was sent to Vietnam. His name was Jonas, and his immediate family was somewhat indifferent to him. But those who knew him outside that immediate family loved Jonas very much because of his enormous consideration for other people. One of his cousins remembered that if his dad said he needed something at the store, it was not the cousin who would volunteer to go, but Jonas who would leap at the opportunity. He was that kind of young man. In Vietnam, an enemy grenade landed in the middle of his outfit. Jonas leaped upon the grenade in order to save the lives of his friends. In dying, he gave his life for those he loved. In so doing he lived out Jesus' new commandment to "love as I have loved."

Chances are we will not have the opportunity to give our life by falling on a grenade to save our friend's life. But what we can do is just about as hard. We can give up our own will to Him. Only as we put to death what Paul calls our flesh- our selfish desires that seek our own glory and comfort- can we do God's will.

So we have two love commandments- an old one and a new one. The old applies to all people, but the new- is an intensified love- a love focused directly at the disciples- and all who are followers of Jesus.

Our relationship with one another is to be a witness to the world of what true love is. We are not just to open our doors and windows and shout out what love is. Rather, we are to open our lives and let the world look in and see true love at work in us.

We are not simply to preach, but to practice love- and not as the world knows love to be, but a love born out of the experience of being loved by the Lord of love.







A gut-wrenching firsthand account of the war that is a classic in the annals of Viet Nam literature by a Marine who lived on the front lines.

"Guns Up" was the battle cry that sent Marine gunners forward with their M-60 firepower to mow down the enemy. Johnnie Clark heard that the lifespan of a machine gunner was about 7-10 seconds upon meeting the enemy. He was only 18 years old when sent to Hue during the Tet offensive, but grew up fast when faced with the cold, hard facts of Marines in battle. Guns Up is a fast read that brings you inside the minds and hearts of the highly dedicated young men who served in Viet Nam's worst combat zones




