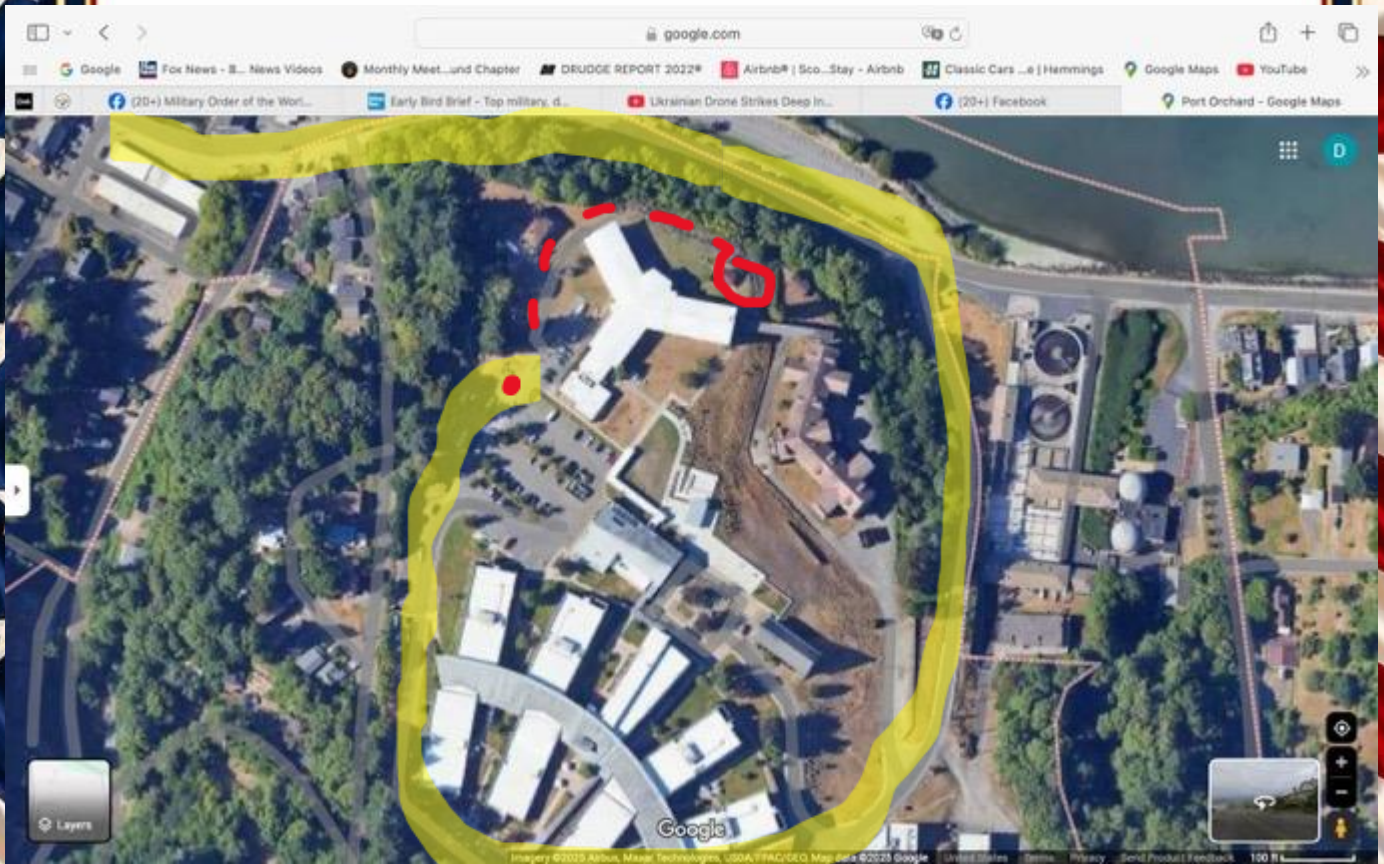

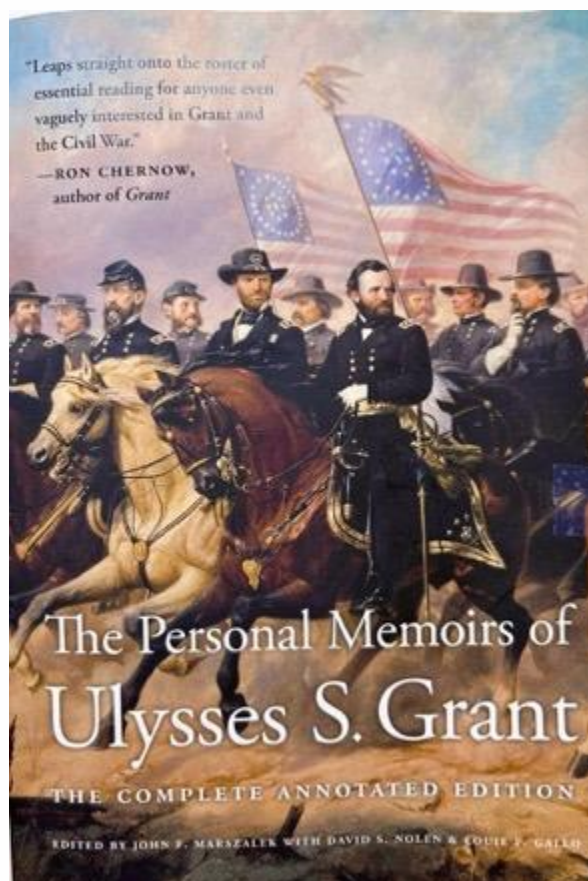

****America 250***



June 14 marks the 251st anniversary of the Continental Army, but there was little time to celebrate.

As Washington prepared New York for a possible invasion, he reinforced Henry Knox's artillery command. Throughout the spring, calls for independence grew across the thirteen colonies. On June 7, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia introduced a resolution for independence, seconded by John Adams, but Congress delayed action for three weeks while delegates sought instructions from their home governments. By this day 250 years ago, Connecticut had become the third colony to authorize support for independence, with New Hampshire and Delaware following the next day. As momentum grew, Congress appointed a committee of five in late June to draft a declaration, though Thomas Jefferson wrote most of the first version.

Congress formally took up the question on July 1, 1776. After debate, and with one vote per colony, nine colonies voted for independence, while Pennsylvania and South Carolina voted no, New York abstained, and Delaware was split. July 2 and after further debate, twelve of the thirteen colonies voted for independence, with only New York abstaining. On July 4, Congress approved the final wording of the Declaration of Independence.

The Traveling Wall comes to Lacey, WA in June and Companion Laura Kern was asked to speak about nurses in Vietnam

I would like to thank The Wall That Heals Lacey Committee for allowing me to speak this evening. I would also like to thank all the audience, veterans and non-veterans alike for taking the time to honor all Vietnam vets by being here.

For many years, no one wanted to listen to us. Not our mothers or fathers, not our friends, not our colleagues at work...no one. Many vets were pushed, screamed at, and call a baby killer--that would be soldiers and nurses alike. Today we are telling our story so that no other generation of warrior must be blamed for a war that was not of their making.

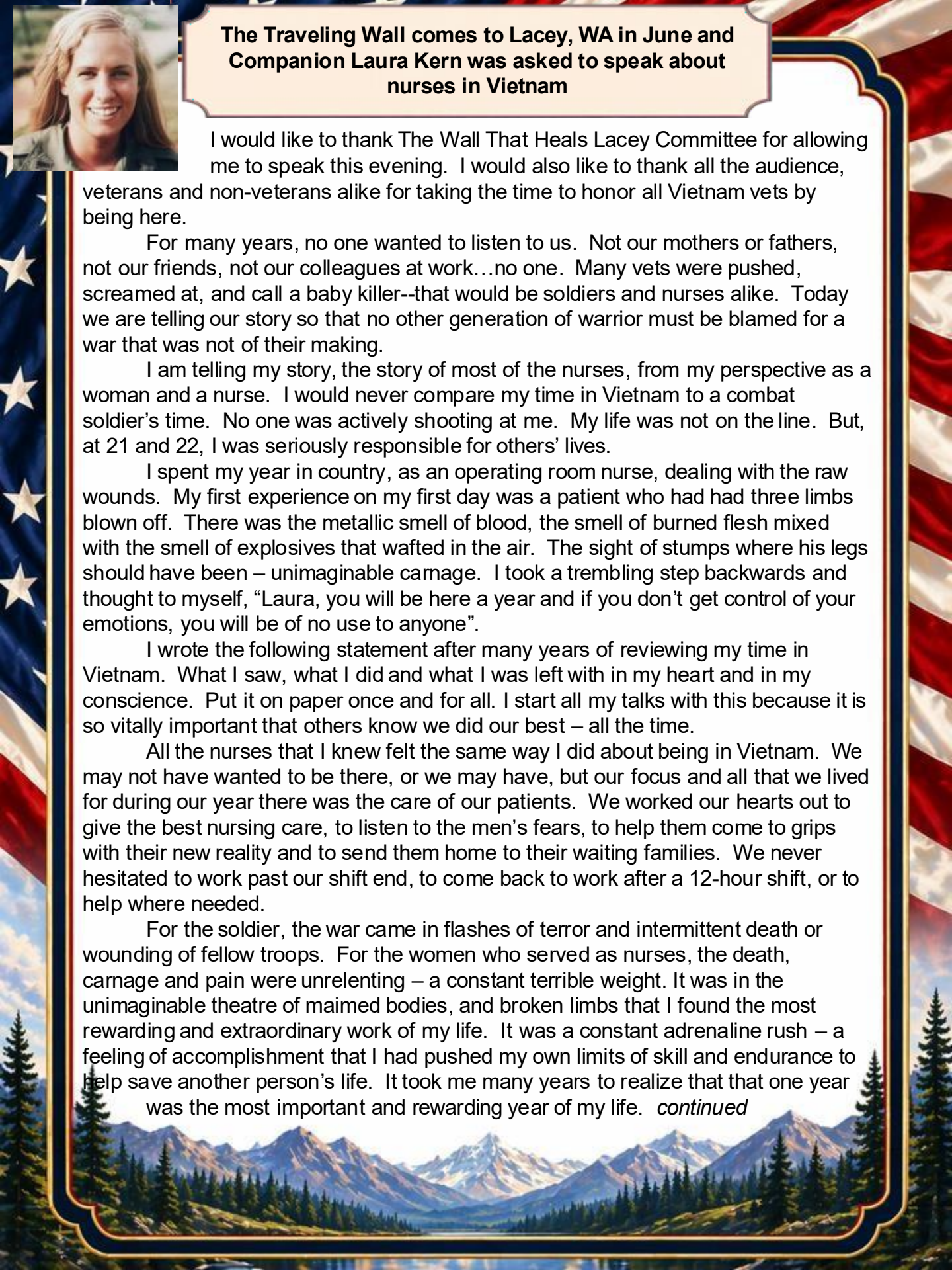
I am telling my story, the story of most of the nurses, from my perspective as a woman and a nurse. I would never compare my time in Vietnam to a combat soldier's time. No one was actively shooting at me. My life was not on the line. But, at 21 and 22, I was seriously responsible for others' lives.

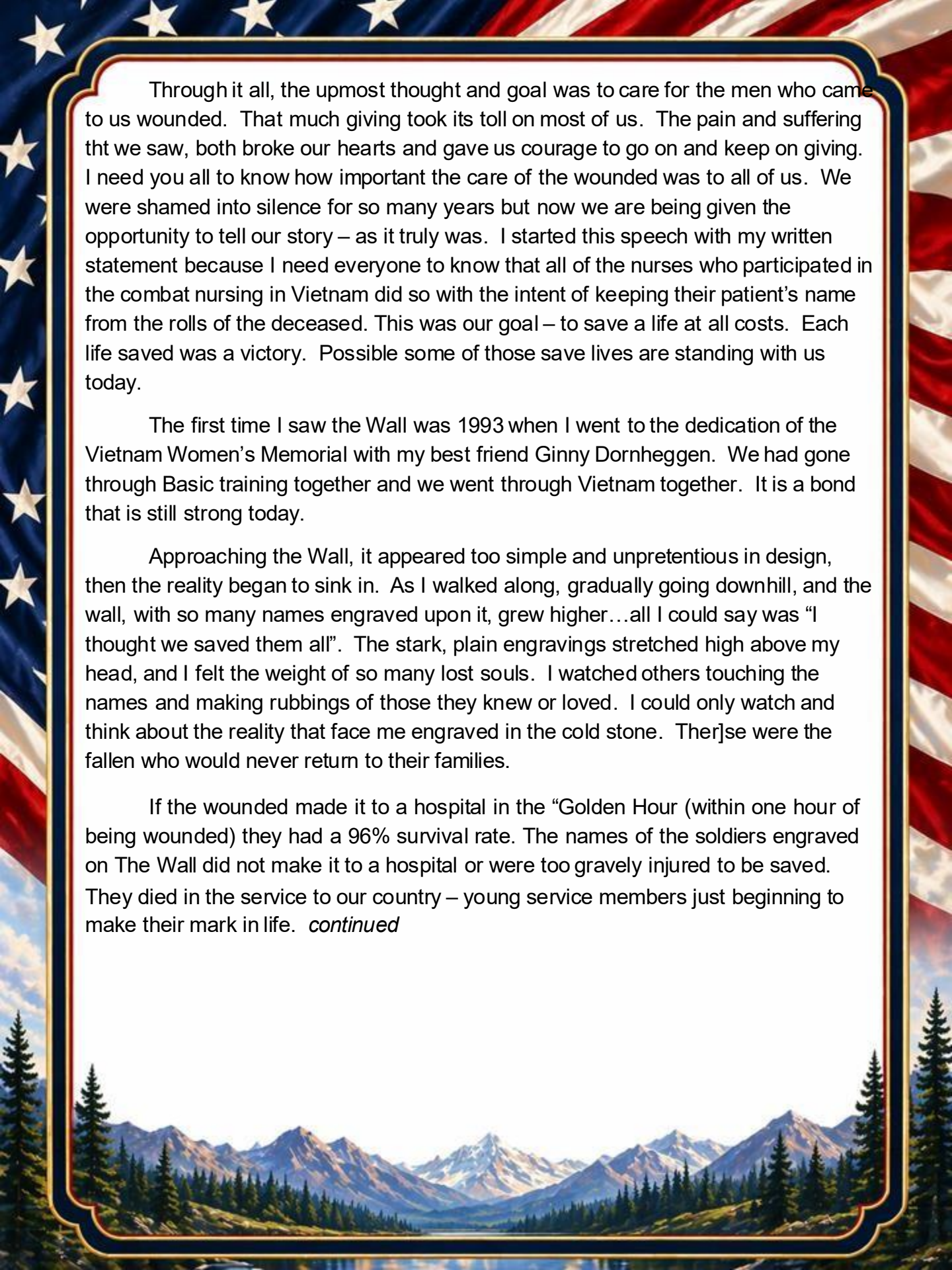
I spent my year in country, as an operating room nurse, dealing with the raw wounds. My first experience on my first day was a patient who had had three limbs blown off. There was the metallic smell of blood, the smell of burned flesh mixed with the smell of explosives that wafted in the air. The sight of stumps where his legs should have been – unimaginable carnage. I took a trembling step backwards and thought to myself, "Laura, you will be here a year and if you don't get control of your emotions, you will be of no use to anyone".

I wrote the following statement after many years of reviewing my time in Vietnam. What I saw, what I did and what I was left with in my heart and in my conscience. Put it on paper once and for all. I start all my talks with this because it is so vitally important that others know we did our best – all the time.

All the nurses that I knew felt the same way I did about being in Vietnam. We may not have wanted to be there, or we may have, but our focus and all that we lived for during our year there was the care of our patients. We worked our hearts out to give the best nursing care, to listen to the men's fears, to help them come to grips with their new reality and to send them home to their waiting families. We never hesitated to work past our shift end, to come back to work after a 12-hour shift, or to help where needed.

For the soldier, the war came in flashes of terror and intermittent death or wounding of fellow troops. For the women who served as nurses, the death, carnage and pain were unrelenting – a constant terrible weight. It was in the unimaginable theatre of maimed bodies, and broken limbs that I found the most rewarding and extraordinary work of my life. It was a constant adrenaline rush – a feeling of accomplishment that I had pushed my own limits of skill and endurance to help save another person's life. It took me many years to realize that that one year was the most important and rewarding year of my life. *continued*

Through it all, the upmost thought and goal was to care for the men who came to us wounded. That much giving took its toll on most of us. The pain and suffering tht we saw, both broke our hearts and gave us courage to go on and keep on giving. I need you all to know how important the care of the wounded was to all of us. We were shamed into silence for so many years but now we are being given the opportunity to tell our story – as it truly was. I started this speech with my written statement because I need everyone to know that all of the nurses who participated in the combat nursing in Vietnam did so with the intent of keeping their patient's name from the rolls of the deceased. This was our goal – to save a life at all costs. Each life saved was a victory. Possible some of those save lives are standing with us today.

The first time I saw the Wall was 1993 when I went to the dedication of the Vietnam Women's Memorial with my best friend Ginny Dornheggen. We had gone through Basic training together and we went through Vietnam together. It is a bond that is still strong today.

Approaching the Wall, it appeared too simple and unpretentious in design, then the reality began to sink in. As I walked along, gradually going downhill, and the wall, with so many names engraved upon it, grew higher...all I could say was "I thought we saved them all". The stark, plain engravings stretched high above my head, and I felt the weight of so many lost souls. I watched others touching the names and making rubbings of those they knew or loved. I could only watch and think about the reality that face me engraved in the cold stone. Ther]se were the fallen who would never return to their families.

If the wounded made it to a hospital in the "Golden Hour (within one hour of being wounded) they had a 96% survival rate. The names of the soldiers engraved on The Wall did not make it to a hospital or were too gravely injured to be saved. They died in the service to our country – young service members just beginning to make their mark in life. *continued*



The travelling Wall has arrived in Lacey to bring this part of our history to young and old alike who may have never seen or learned about this tribute to those young service members whose names can be so clearly read. It has come to bring this powerful, simple, black piece of rock that has spoken to the millions who have seen it and been so moved by its quiet, potent message. Honor these names, remember that each one was a person who went to Vietnam to serve their country. Honor these names, each one who had family and loved ones waiting for them to return. Honor these names, each one who had hopes and dreams for their future that might have been. Honor these names for the many lives that were changed forever on a day in Vietnam.

The most important thing you can do after you visit this traveling Wall is to tell others about it. Tell them about the names engraved on the stone that spoke to you – the silent conversation between the living and the fallen. Use this understanding to reach out to Vietnam Veterans who may have never been thanked for their service. Tell them that their service mattered and that it and they are not forgotten. Let them hear those healing words – Welcome Home. You are remembered. You are honored. You will never be forgotten.
